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This course is an introduction to the study of sociology, including the study of social behavior, & the organization of human society. Students will learn about the historical development of the field of sociology, the importance & role of culture, social structure, & socialization.

- 5 Students will evaluate how cultures develop & evolve.
- 6 Students will analyze social structure & interaction within society.

Socialization & Social Control

- 7 Students will explain the process of socialization.
- 8 Students will analyze the functions of social institutions as agents of social control.
- 9 Students will analyze forms of social inequality.

My goal is for you to see the connection between the individual & society, as well as understand how social forces shape both individual & group behavior. We will seek to understand & explain human social behavior through the use of videos, group projects, class presentations, discussions, notes, & reading.

Grading & Homework

Grades in this class will be determined by homework, in-class assignments, participation, quizzes, tests, & projects. Grades will follow the OCHS grading scale, which can be found in your planner (pg. 20).

In order to retake an assessment, you must have completed ALL homework and in-class assignments. Most assessments may be retaken or revised, except the final exam. There will be a deadline for retaking assessments that you as a student are responsible for meeting.

On these assignments, bibliographic information and citations are required. At OCHS, MLA version 7 is used.
