Four-Step Summary Paragraph

Step 1 Write a topic sentence using the three-part topic sentence method (the burrito fold).

Identify the Item.	Select a Verb.	Finish Your Thought.

Step 2 Copy the sentence to look like a real sentence. Edit to fix spelling and capitalization errors.

Step 3 Create a fact outline. Make a short outline or list of the facts you will include in the summary.

Step 4 Use your fact outline to write the summary paragraph.

Revision Strategy: Blending Textual Support

Direct quotes from reading passages should be blended into an essay, not listed separately. The blending of quotes and commentary shows a maturity in writing that usually scores higher on essay tests.

Requirements for Effective Blending

Blend text smoothly with the analysis.

Blends need to be grammatically correct.

Explain the text and include it with the writer's words, revealing why this text helps prove the point.

Don't blend too early, without first setting up the aspect of the topic sentence the quotation is supposed to support. Be sure it is clear how this supports the topic sentence or previous statement.

Explain the context of the quotation.

There are three basic methods for blending. Ideally, you will use a variety/combination of two or three methods.

Method One:

Blend the text as if the words were already a natural part of the sentence

<u>Unblended</u> - Another trait that exemplifies his virtue of loyalty is in a passage that states "he had done nobly in war" (11). This shows not only his physical brawn and strength, but also his loyalty and beliefs toward God by going on the crusade.

Blended – Not only has the Knight 'done nobly in war' (11), proving his loyalty to both God and country, but also he dispels a myth that all brawny warriors prefer killing to traveling on pilgrimages.

Method Two:

Identify the speaker of the dialogue before the quotation.

Example – The king sadly emits, 'He was my closest counselor, he was keeper of my thoughts...men of birth and merit all should be as Ashhere was!' (1062).

Method Three:

Use a colon. The sentence that precedes the colon explains the writer's point; what follows is his evidence.

Example —By excluding himself from humanity and working with incredible devotion, Frankenstein discovers how to generate life: "I pursued knowledge to her hiding places... [and] I became myself capable of bestowing animation upon lifeless matter" (50).
